What does it mean to develop "self-expression"

with clear communication skills?

Internationally, the Japanese may be seen as poker-faced and not showing their feelings clearly.

There are two possible reasons why the Japanese are seen this way. One is because Japanese tend to adopt this stance as a way of showing respect to others and it is also a result of traditional Japanese education.

Traditionally Japanese education tends to focus on acquiring knowledge, while developing students' people skills has been seen as less important than accruing new knowledge.

However, due to the acceleration of globalization in Japan, this traditional method of education is being reconsidered.

A lack of expression makes it difficult to convey your thoughts and feelings to others. It may also cause difficulties in both personal and workplace relationships.

Under the course of study, it describes developing "self-expression" as an essential life skill.

We inspire our children to communicate their ideas and feelings with others.

Children who can clearly express themselves

At Kinder Kids, children take part in Circle Time from Nursery level as part of the daily routine and learn how to express themselves, and the importance of sharing their feelings with friends.

Toddlers often can't express their needs verbally to say "I want my toys back!". Crying, pinching or biting their friends is a substitute for the messages that they can't yet express with words. At those moments, we teach children how to respond depending on the situation, and provide them with the language they need to express themselves.

We frequently use words like "sorry" "thank you" or "please" during reading time, play activities and throughout the day. Children see examples of situations where these words can help them to express their feelings, empowering them to communicate.

In Kinder level classes, children have theme discussions where they use their theme workbooks as a tool to explore their feelings or ideas around the topic and share them. Additionally, children take part in "Show and Tell" to share their experiences or interests with their classmates, helping them become confident public speakers.

As the children have new experiences in class they will also develop new vocabulary so they can adequately describe and express their reactions to these.

Developing strong communication skills that allow the children to share their opinions effectively with other people will be a benefit to them throughout their life.



A student from our Canada School used our transfer system to visit Yokohama School. Her mother returning temporarily to her hometown took advantage of our service.

Visiting a different country for a while with kids can be challenging and stressful for both parents and children. However, by using Kinder Kids' transfer system, she could transfer to Kinder Kids Yokohama smoothly without changing her uniform, textbooks or having to miss any education. She enjoyed school in Japan just as much as she did at Kinder Kids Canada . We asked the mother what she thought about using the Transfer System.



- Why did you choose to send your children to Kinder Kids?

I chose Kinder Kids because I heard positive feedback about Kinder Kids from people I know. Also, there is a transfer system and staff are bilingual. When I visited the school, it had a good ambience that is also a reason why I chose Kinder Kids.

Did you have any concerns before coming to Japan? If you did, were those concerns resolved after you arrived?

My daughter can be shy so I worried about how she would adjust to the new surroundings. However, the class teachers and her classmates were very bright and friendly and my worries soon disappeared.

— Kinder Kids doesn't arrange a place for you to stay in Japan. How did you make arrangements for your accommodation?

Luckily, my parents' home was close to the Kinder Kids school so we were staying at my parents'.

— Tell us about your child's first day at school: Were they nervous or were they excited? Although she didn't say it, I could feel that she was a little bit nervous.



— Did you join any events held at School?

There was an Open Day held so I went along to it. It was a very nice opportunity to see my daughter enjoying her class.

 How did you spend your holidays? Please tell us about your favorite places, recommendations or tourist destinations.

Our favorite place is "Kodomo No Kuni" and not to mention, Disneyland was lots of fun.

A Shopping mall called "Tressa Yokohama" was also fun for her, especially because she could ride in the shopping cart. Shopping carts that kids can ride in is uncommon in Canadian shopping malls, and even if there is one, we would have to pay 5 dollars so she doesn't usually get to ride it.

 Do you recommend other students experience the transfer to Japan? Please give advice to those who are thinking about participating in the program about how to prepare.

Yes, I definitely would recommend it. There is no need for any particular preparation but the school year has a different structure in Japan to Canada (the school year in Japan is from April to March, but it is January to December in Canada), so depending on when you transfer, you may go into a different class from your local school class. Therefore, it is safer if you check which level your child will go into before you transfer and find out how it is different.

My daughter was born in February, so she is preschool in Kinder Kids Canada, but she is in K1 class in Japan. (In Canada, Kinder class starts only from 4 years old for 2 years). She was confused in the beginning when she found out there was no nap time, and she needed to write a sentence for homework because she only knew how to trace the alphabet. She attended class every day although she only went three days a week to Kinder Kids Canada (you can choose three days or five days per week in Canada's preschool).



Procedures for taking lessons



approx. 22 minutes

For students who can't attend Eiken class

This great opportunity is offered only for K3 students who will be taking Grade 5 & 4 exams. We started these online lessons to help students who want to join Eiken class but due to their conditions (such as a schedule conflicts or their school currently doesn't have Eiken class etc.,) are unable to physically partake.

They will learn about the format of the Eiken test as well as how to study for it effectively, particularly the reading test. Your child will be required to submit homework in order to practice what they have learned in the lesson. Keeping their age in mind, ideally it is better to study with 'study buddies' in a school as they will gain more motivation than they would just studying by themselves. However, if there is no other choice then take the online lesson - please apply!

We also provide lessons that prepare children for the second stage speaking test for those who passed the first stage of grade 3.

The first stage of Eiken will take place around the time when new K3 students are participating in Sports Day.

Around this time there are usually only a few students who can join Eiken Class so there are usually only a few students who will take the Eiken test. However, this year, two students for grade 3, and 15 students for grade 4 took the test at group test sites of Kinder Kids.

The result was impressive; both students passed grade3, and 13 students out of 15 passed grade 4!

Our teachers were very proud of them, and we hope that they gained some confidence from this experience and will move on to the next step.
