▶ What was your childhood like? What were your dreams or goals for the future?

With my parents' encouragement I played rugby and wanted to become a rugby player. I played a variety of other sports too.

▶ Why did you choose to enroll in middle and high school in New Zealand?

I chose to study abroad because there were only a few middle schools that had rugby teams in Kanagawa Prefecture, and I thought I could play more rugby in New Zealand. There were not many international students back then, so it was a good experience for me to communicate with the local students.

► How was it living in New Zealand?

In the beginning, I spent my time not knowing what was going on. But I started to get to know the people and made many friends while playing rugby. I was also able to spend my school days just like the other local students. Thanks to rugby, I was able to have a fulfilling school life compared to other international students.

As many of you may already know, we have resumed accepting Global Transfer System applications, which had been suspended due to the spread of COVID-19. Clarkson School in Canada was the only school that accepted Global Transfer students, but from this school year, we started accepting students for our newly-founded Oakville School in Canada, and our Hawaii School, which makes a total of three schools that will accept Global Transfer System applications. The Global Transfer System, which makes students feel safe and secure in the same uniform and study in a familiar Kinder Kids environment, which helps students to have wonderful experiences.

- · Hawaii School Kinder Class K1-K2 students *No K3 Class due to the difference in the school system

[Enrollment Grade Level]

The grade level of the students during the transfer period is decided according to their birthdates. The students may be placed in a grade level different from their current grade level.



~Overseas Travel and the Hague Convention~

The Hague Convention is a multilateral treaty, which seeks to protect children from the harmful effects of wrongful removal and retention across international boundaries. (as of October 2019, 101 countries including Japan are parties to the Convention as members of the treaty). Because of this treaty, when a child under 16 years of age travels alone (school trip) or with one parent, some countries require a letter of consent from both parents if traveling alone, or a travel consent form from the one parent who will not be going together with the other parent. (*Canada and Hawaii require a travel consent form if only one parent is traveling)

Please check the details about the transferring country and school as the condition may vary.

Thinking about the challenges faced until passing the Grade 2 Examination

I am not very good at writing sentences, so I found the English composition section of 3rd Grade especially difficult. I thought the upper grade would be more difficult since more words were required to write the composition. But as I became used to writing sentences, and learned about writing patterns, I no longer felt it was difficult to learn the increased number of words.

I used new words I found in books and newspapers. and even when I was playing with my younger sister, (who is in K1). Right away she used the words again and again, and that helped me to build up my vocabulary. To improve my writing skill, I tried to write what I wanted to say in my journal homework, wrote letters to friends, made my own picture books, etc. For the speaking test preparation, I made use of the videos uploaded on Kinder+.

What kind of books and newspapers

Recently, THE LAST KIDS ON EARTH series, Treehouse series, THE DANGER GANG, Nazotoki (Riddle solving) series, etc. I also borrow books that interest me from the library and read over 10 books a day, or more than 300 books a month. I subscribe to The Japan Times Alpha, a newspaper for English learners. It is easy to read with pictures and short sentences, and the meanings of words are explained at the bottom.



What I like about Kinder Kids!

I study the words that appear in the higher Grades of the EIKEN tests from the teachers' daily conversations. I also thought that the journal homework was very helpful in preparing for the Eiken. I tried new words and phrases that I found in books on teachers, and they would correct me, so I was able to learn how to use new vocabulary correctly.

My advice to friends

The amount of writing English such as journals will increase in K3. This will make the composition test in Eiken easier, and also improve your speaking skill because you write what you think. Using difficult words and phrases will help to build up your vocabulary. I recommend that you do your best to write your journal.

Asked his parents

How did you support him?

We let him learn what is going on in the world through the news on TV and newspapers, and try to notice what is catching his interest. We also explain even simple things to him thoroughly and, if possible, have actual experiences together to learn about our society and add to his common knowledge. For example, we actually compared bank tellers, ATMs, and online banking, and asked him which one was more convenient. Then we expanded our conversation and let him think about the reason why the banks close at 3pm or why the number of ATMs is decreasing.
